



- LGBTQ+ Spouse/Partner Loss Group is a six-week series for people grieving the death of their spouse or life partner. It meets Tuesdays, July 20 to August 24, from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

These groups meet online and are open to the public. There is no fee for people whose family member was in hospice care in the past 12 months; fees for others can be lowered or waived, if needed. Pre-registration is required; call (608) 327-7118 with questions or to register.
