

Calling Attention to all Asbury History Buffs and Book Lovers



Our April Ministry focused on our local CROP Walk. We thank all who participated in the walk and who gave monetary donations that benefit those in need in our community as twenty-five percent of the funds raised are returned to ECHO in our community to support local hunger-fighting efforts. Our May Ministry Highlights will feature Native American Ministry. On Native American Ministries Sunday, United Methodists cultivate and support urban missions with Native Americans and fund scholarships for Native American seminarians. Our Wisconsin Conference retains 50 percent of the offering to strengthen and develop Native American ministries. The remaining 50 percent of the offering expands mission work with the Native American Urban Initiative and provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist and other approved schools of theology.

Ministry Start Date: The Odanah United Methodist Church was dedicated on April 3, 1898, by A. J. Davis of the Ashland District. Its founder and first minister was Thomas C. Thomas, an ordained Ojibwa Native American from Michigan. Thomas was a member of the West Wisconsin Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and was elected during his time to be a delegate to Washington DC. The Oneida Church, another Wisconsin UMC church, is close to 200 years old and the oldest church in the Conference having brought the Methodist Societies to Wisconsin from New York. The church is open to all people as well as all Native Americans. The Oneida Church is committed to walk alongside the traditionalists, while bringing the gospel to them in a culturally sensitive way.

Ministry Purpose: Whether it is providing shelter for victims of domestic violence, filling food pantries, starting new churches or educating Native American seminary students, this designated offering takes place as a way United Methodists honor Native Americans.

Ministry Vision: On Native American Ministries Sunday, United Methodists cultivate and support urban missions with Native Americans and fund scholarships for Native American seminarians.

Ministry Mission Statement: When you give generously on Native American Ministries Sunday, you equip seminary students who honor and celebrate Native American culture in their ministries. You empower congregations to find fresh and culturally appropriate ways to minister to their communities with Christ's love.

Ministry Needs: This offering funds scholarships for United Methodist Native American seminarians, strengthens and develops Native American ministries and communities, both urban and rural, and supports Native American outreach at the annual conference level. Remember you can celebrate this Sunday and any Special Sunday on a day of your choosing.


