What's Next With Worship? – Part Two

In last month's newsletter we began to ponder what worship might look like as the weather changes and the pandemic worsens. As I write this, Wisconsin is breaking record after record concerning COVID-19 cases in our state. We are currently the hotspot in the nation as far as infections go.

It is against this reality that **we will return to "online worship" exclusively** for the time being. We will continue to watch the infection numbers closely and adjust when it is safer.

At some point, I still plan to offer an opportunity for Spiritual Formation by making the sanctuary available for a time of "Prayer and Meditation." We will restrict the number of people present at any given moment – probably not more than ten worshippers – and reservations will be required. Of course, masks and maximum social distancing will need to be observed.

This "Prayer and Meditation" opportunity may include a Scripture reading, a devotion, or a pastoral prayer, and recorded music. For those wishing to view it, the online worship service may be shown on the big screen following approximately 15 minutes of prayer and meditation.

Further ideas for this opportunity are welcomed.

I am considering three "Prayer and Meditation" opportunities during the week. Sundays at 10 a.m., Tuesdays at 10 a.m., and Thursdays at 2 p.m.

The church office will notify the congregation when this Spiritual Formation opportunity will begin.


Ministry Mission Statement: ECHO's mission is dedicated to meeting housing, food and other basic human needs and addressing the barriers to self-sufficiency.





Virtual Visits Keep Agrace 'Alongside' Patients


How we've adapted to prevent COVID-19 spread

The beauty of both hospice and palliative care is being alongside a patient through tough times, physically and emotionally. But in 2020, very little is as it should be.

As COVID-19 continues to prevent us from entering some patients' homes and long-term care facilities, virtual visits are saving the day. Using smartphones, iPads or laptop computers, video chats let our staff see our patients—and our patients see their loved ones.







- 1. Masks: Make and donate cloth masks. They're needed for visitors who arrive at Agrace without one.
- 2. Comfort shawls: Handmade shawls and lap blankets are a comfort to our patients. All donated shawls and lap blankets must be in plastic bags. Please, no holiday colors so that they can be used year long.
