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Pastor's Pondering

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung's State of the Church Address.

Beautiful people of the Wisconsin Conference of the United Methodist Church, it has been my most profound honor and privilege to serve as your Bishop these past twelve years and as one of your pastors and District Superintendents throughout my career. As I prepared for this time of sharing, I have taken time to reflect upon my time spent with you, my beautiful people, and my faith journey and give God thanks.

During this time of reflection, I remember studying for tests in high school. I was often at school all day, dedicated to my studies until midnight and sometimes at 1 in the morning. It was a time of profound dedication to my faith development and worship. I would need to get up and go to prayer service at 4 a.m., which required more discipline than I sometimes had! It was by the grace of God, church bells ringing, and sometimes, hearing in my dreams my name that I would wake up, splash cold water on my face, say, "Wake up Hee-Soo," and take the quick jog down the street to the church.

These are the years that I have often forgotten about – or glossed over, but these were essential times in which I formed habits of prayer, priorities, and listening. I remember saying, "Wake me up, O God so that I might worship You." I still earnestly pray to God, "Lord, refresh me so that I might fully serve and worship you."

These are my feelings today, post-pandemic, post-disaffiliation, Post-General Conference: "Lord, refresh us so that we might fully serve and worship you."

We have heard about the decisions of the General Conference—regionalization, revised social principles, and removal of harmful language regarding our siblings in Christ, the LGBQ+ community. Our delegation has faithfully served and shared these decisions and the next steps for us to live into a post-general Conference United Methodism. Please join me in offering our appreciation for their service.

Beautiful people, it is time for us to refresh our faith and be resolute in living it out. In Colossians 2:6-7, we are given clear instructions about our faith,

"My counsel for you is simple and straightforward: Just go ahead with what you've been given. You received Christ Jesus, the Master; now live him. You're deeply rooted in him. You're well- constructed upon him. You

know your way around the faith. Now, do what you've been taught. School's out; quit studying the subject and start living it! And let your living spill over into thanksgiving".

Over the last twelve years, we have been given much – we are blessed: It has been my great privilege to visit every church in the Wisconsin Conference.

It was my greatest joy to meet and talk with churches and leaders with precious heritage and sincerity, go up to the podium at every church, offer prayers of thanks in the altar, and talk about dreams, life together, and fruits of ministry together.

We came together under the missional direction of **Imagine Wisconsin Anew**, added **Radical inclusion and racial justice**, and **the Beloved Community**, gathered prayers and strength through the Imagine No Malaria campaign. We praise God for the fruits and grateful hearts.

We have launched 31 ministries—Hispanic, Korean, Dai Myanmar, Congolese, Anglo, and recovery ministry—and chartered three. Our New Ministries Strategy Board has been busy helping to develop the program for launching ministries further and building ways for sustainability within our structure over time. We continue to train church planters through our ICD and ICD courses, constantly striving towards excellence. Conference MCCI Initiative has been fruitful.

We have provided extensive cabinet and extended cabinet training on cultural competency, started intentional training for cross-cultural appointments, and are developing new ways to engage in radical inclusion and racial justice. I am grateful for our clergy and lay leadership, who have helped us identify and strategize how we may live into our vision of radical inclusion and racial justice. We aren't there yet – but we hold onto the vision of Beloved Community.

My joy is the purposeful diversity our clergy community represents. In the last twelve months, we have actively sought more inclusion by recruiting seven Filipino and Indian clergy, thus expanding our inclusion within our clergy community. This appointment season, we have 38% non-Anglo clergy; this equates to 122 clergy. Would you join me in appreciating these recruitment efforts?

We celebrate our international partnerships with the Dongbu Conference – Missional friendship with Korean Methodist Church became a long-standing relationship. Through this special relationship we mutually learn and support God's Kin(g)dom vision together. We have collaborated church to church and Conference to Conference mutual support and vision making. Last visit was highlighted with Dr. Javier, President of Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary and their faculty accompanied together with our Wisconsin delegations. Exchange and mutual support in mission and theological education will be fruitful in future journey.

We also celebrate our work with the Bolivia Evangelical Methodist Church. Our connection is significant since this has been an ongoing mission for the NIC and WI under my episcopal leadership. This past month, a group worked at the Elderly Home, hooking up lights and shower heads, installing locks, assembling beds, sanding, cleaning, and preparing for the Elderly to have an accessible place to go. It was a privilege and delight to consecrate these rooms and this space for God's glory. May this ministry be a blessing to all those they serve.

And since we are celebrating, let's praise God for the generosity and faithful giving of all those who have given to support the mission and ministry.

We celebrate that 215 local churches, paid 100% of their 2023 apportionments and that the Wisconsin Conference paid 100% of its apportionment to GCFA! Halleluia!

And there is more abundance; in addition to paying apportionments, our churches contributed over \$1.1 million

in special giving to 100 different programs. We heard about the rainbow covenant yesterday, and our intentionality has supported health and wellness initiatives, education, disaster relief, missionaries, bible distribution, and more.

The United Methodist Church's faith is rooted in Wesleyan theology, which emphasizes a responsible mission pursued "together" in all we live and do. Wesley did not take the experience and basis of love and salvation in individual formations; he kept reminding us we are on this journey together. Although it is a theological discourse, Wesley was the one who thoroughly pursued social sanctification achieved "together" in a relationship of interdependence.

We seek our mission as we work together and fulfill it as Kingdom people. Wesley's invitation that the community is responsible for our living mission and ethical practice will lead the future of the Wisconsin Conference. God has called us to love, live, and bounce forward together. It's about praying for each other. It is about solidarity with one another through deep friendship.

By accepting and caring for each other, we are leading the future of the Wisconsin Conference.

Let us continue to expand a world where we love and respect everyone unconditionally with the love of God.

It is there that future generations will have hope in Christ Jesus. There, you will inherit the traditions and heritage of the past and live a faith that is firmly and deeply rooted. Future generations, like today, will dedicate themselves to build a bigger world with the love of Jesus Christ.

Wisconsin's future is God's future. That future is diversity. Creation is diversity, and that is the beauty of creation, a world of harmony that is different but one.

Let us live in harmony in love, considering it as the highest value that even though we are racially and ethnically diverse, and have diverse interests and theological backgrounds, the colors of that diversity become one in Jesus.

The Bible says: "There is no fear in love." 1 John 4:18

"No power in the world can separate us from the love of the Lord," Romans 8:38

"Faith overcomes the world." 1 John 5:4

Within these biblical teachings and truths, let us discern and dedicate ourselves to one another, considering unity in diversity as Wisconsin's dream. Let us pray for each other and do our best so that the DNA of Wisconsin can be the practice and faith in welcoming everyone in the name of the Lord, respecting everyone with love, considering everyone as brothers and sisters, and welcoming and exalting everyone as children of God.

Now, after 12 years of episcopal leadership in Wisconsin, I will be moving on to a new annual conference, My heart remains a dynamic, grateful spirit in Wisconsin. YES, Wisconsin is the best state that raised me and my family.

You are my beautiful people, dear friends, and sojourners in Christ.
