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PASTOR'S CORNER

A Moment or a Movement?

For the second year, national Juneteenth and Independence Day celebrations take on even greater significance. Although we are still in a pandemic, we are grateful that we can more safely participate in public events with family and friends. The very idea of Juneteenth and Independence Day conjure ecstatic feelings of celebration when we think about

the victories we have won as Americans, African Americans, and people of faith. However, even though America declared her independence from British domination in 1776, millions of African Americans continued in slavery until the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863. Thousands more African Americans were trapped for over 80 years in what Douglas Blackmon calls an "Age of Neoslavery."

As we celebrate July 4 this year, we do so following the first anniversary of the nation's historic decision to make Juneteenth a federal holiday. The celebration of Juneteenth marks a national holiday when we can confront our past, celebrate our progress, acknowledge the unfinished work, and assess where we go from here. We must not forget that it took the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment in 1865 to officially abolish slavery and free over 100,000 enslaved Africans from Kentucky to Delaware.

We are still dealing with the problem of racism—even though slavery was officially abolished over 150 years ago in America; discrimination is prohibited on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, and national origin; all citizens who are old enough to register to vote have the right to vote regardless of race (while some people with felony convictions and those who are mentally incapacitated can not vote); and many African Americans have risen to levels of achievement unimagined in past generations. The legacy of slavery has impacted American society in every period from Reconstruction until now, including Post Reconstruction, the Civil Rights Movement, and the Modern Civil Rights Movement.

America still has not fulfilled her promise to provide everyone the opportunity to realize their full human potential. The persistence of fatal police shootings of unarmed Black people with scant accountability; the disturbing rise of hate crimes and Black voter suppression; discrimination in housing, employment, education, healthcare; and subtle manifestations of racism today remind us of how our Independence Day celebrations can be fraught with both joy and grief.

As we prepare to celebrate another Independence Day, may the paradox of this occasion never escape us. It signifies the tension between a moment and a movement. When we look back, we are reflecting on an important historical moment. As we gather with our families around dinner tables and at national monuments, let us not forget the fearless African Americans who were slaves while fighting for this nation's liberty. Let us remember African Americans, women, and people of color, who built this great country but never received fair compensation

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or recognition for their service and sacrifices. Let us remember that, as Christians, when this nation refused to grant our freedom, Christ affirmed our freedom and God's power gave our people the courage and the faith to fight for a world that will one day see us as God sees us.

As we celebrate Independence
Day, let this also be a time when we reaffirm our commitment to join an ongoing movement for constitutional advancement. Frederick Douglass' words in "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?" are still relevant and insightful: "I say it with a sad sense of disparity between us. I am not included within the pale of glorious anniversary! Your high independence only reveals the immeasurable distance between us."

As we celebrate Independence Day with both joy and sadness and hope and skepticism, may we be so inspired to reinvest in the struggle to overcome the "immeasurable distance" of inequality and discrimination that separates Black and white, male and female, and rich and poor until that day when freedom and justice are a reality for all people. •

Nineteenth Street Attends *An African American Requiem*

Members and friends of Nineteenth Street gathered at the Kennedy Center on May 23 for the East Coast premiere of Damien Geter's *An African American Requiem*. The Choral Arts Society of Washington sponsored the performance, which featured joint choruses and orchestras, a superb vocal quartet, two conductors, and a poet-narrator. The composer of this master work, Damien Geter, is in his 30s. The choir, orchestra, and conductors were a powerful intergenerational and intercultural blend of artists. Siera Toney, in partnership with the Choral Arts Society of Washington, organized the outing.

The 22 attendees from Nineteenth Street were an intergenerational mix, including representatives from the Relax, Relate, Release (R3) Fellowship, the Young Adult Ministry, the Progressive Adults' Love Pals Program, The Fruit of the Spirit Ministry, the Music Ministry, the Global Missions Ministry, GriefShare, the Board of Trustees, and ministerial staff. Nineteenth Street's party included alumni from Bennett College, Bowie State University, Howard University, Morehouse College, and Spelman College, as well as a Howard Law professor and current students from Howard University's Schools of Divinity and Dentistry.

While the mixture of participants evoked our May Family Month, the performance was a great primer for Black Music Month, which is in June. The program covered various styles in the Black classical music tradition, from spirituals to jazz to arias. The pieces were sung in African American



Vernacular English, the liturgical Latin characteristic of a requiem mass, and incorporated the words of Black justice icons, like Eric Garner, George Floyd, and anti-lynching activist Ida B. Wells-Barnett. Geter's *Requiem* was both a lament of racism, state violence, and systemic injustice through the present-day, and a celebration of Black creativity, Black resilience, Black community, and Black brilliance.

The evening opened with a *Spirituals Suite for Choir and Orchestra* featuring arrangements by Rev. Nolan Williams, an alum of Howard University School of Divinity, who presented a performance called *Ethereality: Celestial Dreams and the Great Beyond* at Nineteenth Street in 2019. The *Requiem* experience was a wonderful opportunity to hear and be healed by diverse styles of Black classical music, strong statements for racial and social justice, and rich lessons in Black history in one of the nation's most celebrated performance venues.

Overall, this outing to the Kennedy Center was a wonderful way to end Family Month, prepare for Black Music Month, and uphold our church's rich legacy of supporting the arts! *


