PASTOR'S CORNER

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, "A Time for Everything," is a cherished Bible passage often quoted at funerals and memorial services. Tradition tells us that the book of Ecclesiastes was written by King Solomon toward the end of his reign. Assistant Pastor Vote Set for September 8

The time is finally here to select our Assistant Pastor. There will be a special call meeting at 7:30 p.m. on September 8 to vote for the Assistant Pastor. The Assistant Pastor Search Committee used the same criteria as the Pulpit Search Committee to narrow the field and score the applicants. The three highest-scoring candidates were interviewed by Pastor Darryl Roberts and Deacon Shawn Davis-Wilensky, chair of the Board of Deacons. The candidates were invited to preach. The preaching order was based on their availability:

July 31 - Rev. De'Quon A. Quarles August 14 - Rev. Nicholas K. Young August 21 - Rev. John C. McNeill Jr.

Following each service, members engaged in a question and answer (Q&A) session with the candidate. If you missed any of the candidates, you can watch videos of their sermons and Q&A sessions on Nineteenth Street's **YouTube channel**.

The interview panel made the decision to have members vote on all three candidates. The special call meeting will be held via Zoom. Only members in good standing will be emailed the Zoom link for the meeting. In accordance with the Church Constitution, Article IV, Section 2, to be in good standing, members must have attended at least some church services and contributed financially to the church within the preceding two-year period.

If the church clerk does not have your email address, please send your email address to **office@19thstreetbc.org**. A test email will be sent to every member in good standing for whom we have an email address. A reply to the test email is required so

that the Zoom link for the special call meeting can be sent to the member in good standing. Each member in good standing in a household will have to log in to the Zoom meeting individually with their own email since the voting will be done via Zoom.

Members in good standing who do not have email, or whose schedules prevent them from participating in the meeting, or who access Zoom by phone can vote by casting a paper ballot. You must stop by the church office during church business hours between now and September 8 to cast a paper ballot. Paper ballots will be counted on September 8 prior to the special call meeting. If you plan to vote by paper ballot, please do not reply to the test email to receive the Zoom link.

All three candidates will be listed on the virtual and paper ballots. A simple majority vote will win. Once we ascertain which candidate received the most votes, a motion will be made to elect that person as the Assistant Pastor. Pursuant to the Church Constitution, Article IX, Section 2, a vote of two-thirds of the quorum shall be necessary to carry a motion.

First Colored Baptist Church: Its Early Beginnings

The following is an excerpt from our church's history presented during the 183rd Anniversary Celebration. It covers the period leading up to August 29, 1839, when the First Colored Baptist Church was organized.

The history of the First Colored Baptist Church is integral to that of First Baptist Church of Washington City, which was organized in 1802.

Lot 11, square 118 was selected as the site for building First

Baptist. It was the southwest corner of 19th and I Streets. The church was to the northwest; the building measured 37 feet on the 19th Street side; and 75 feet on the I Street side. It was built at a cost of \$225. The building was no larger than the area on the 16th Street side of our present sanctuary.

When First Baptist's membership grew, the church moved to a larger space. The first building eventually became known as the "Little Old Meeting House." There are no photographs of that building so we only have a lithograph drawn by an artist of First Baptist Church of Washington City.

There were Colored members of the First Baptist Church within a year of its 1802 founding. They were accepted as full and equal members, signing the church covenant; and Black males exercised their right to vote at church business meetings. The Colored membership included servants of noted citizens,

political leaders, freedmen, and enslaved persons.

Ongoing problems came to a head as the country moved toward the Civil War. The church moved toward segregation of the races as the country did. Galleries in the tiny building and separate outside entrances were built to maintain separation of the races. The elimination of freedoms that the Colored members had valued and enjoyed were causes of their discontent.

At that time the Colored citizens of Washington, D.C., could not organize a church on their own. This created an

opportunity for those who had papers of dismission to come to the area and organize a church.

The formal organization of the First Colored Baptist Church of the City of Washington was initiated by Brother William Bush and three women, Sisters Eliza Bush, Lavinia Perry, and Emily Coke, who were not members of First Baptist Church of Washington City.

It is important to note that none of these individuals had been members of a church in the District of Columbia and thus were free to form a church in the city. There were then six members in the "Founding Body," as Elder Sampson White and his wife became members of the organizing group.

On Sunday afternoon of August 29, 1839, Elder Sampson White, Elder Moses Clayton, (founder of the first Negro church in Baltimore), and S.P. Hill (future pastor of First Baptist Church), gathered at the Little Old Meeting House ready to organize the First Colored Baptist Church of Washington City. The leaders questioned the prospective members on their desire to form a Gospel Church. And being satisfied with their answers, each was given the right hand of fellowship. They sang a hymn and offered prayer for the church.

We do know that on this date, August 29, 1839, Elder Sampson White was received by letter unanimously, and was called as the first pastor. He accepted the call and established the Sunday School and served as its first superintendent.

And now, after 183 years of serving our God, our church still stands strong. ❖

Tips for Studying the Bible

How much time should you spend reading the Bible? This question came up two years ago during a Bible Study session led by Rev. Roberts. He responded with several noteworthy tips and insights. Now is a good time to revisit and share his insights as we prepare for fall Bible Study sessions.

Six Tips for Reading and Studying the Bible

- 1. Read with purpose. Remember that the purpose of having Bible study and studying the word of God is to help you grow in the process of sanctification (that is, where we become more holy, and where people begin to see that transformation take place in our lives.) The only way growth can happen is if you keep the purpose in mind as you focus on the Word of God.
- 2. Carve out a special time for study. Pick a consistent time, timeframe, and place to read and study the Bible every day so that it becomes a habit. Even if you commit to just 10 minutes per day, do that where you can focus on the study of God's Word without distractions. Jesus' instruction on prayer applies to studying God's Word: "But when you pray, go into your private room, shut your door, and pray to your Father who is in secret." (Matthew 6:6)
- 3. Seek to understand the entire Bible. Make sure in your study that you are seeking to learn and understand the entire Bible. Don't just focus on your favorite scriptures. Just like we don't start watching a movie from the middle and expect to understand the plot and the conclusion, we

must read the Bible from the beginning to understand the reason for God's plan of salvation through the coming of The Last Adam.

- 4. Read scriptures several times, in several translations.

 Read scriptures multiple times to gain a better understanding. God does not speak to us just through the King James Version. We have been blessed with many translations (some good and some bad) to help us deepen our understanding of scripture—e.g., King James Version, New International Version, The Message Bible, and the New Revised Standard Version. See which translations help make the Bible come alive for you.
- **5. Keep a journal.** Keep a journal about your study. Write questions in it, including questions on how to apply a particular scripture to your life. After you seek answers to your questions by reading another translation or consulting our pastoral staff, add what you've learned to your journal.
- 6. Let the text speak to you. There are many commentaries that interpret the Bible. But read the scripture for yourself first before reading a commentary containing someone else's viewpoint. You want to hear the voice of God speaking to you before amplifying the voices of commentators.

We hope these tips help enhance your study of God's word as you "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." (2 Peter 3:18) *

- What is your message of Christian stewardship to those who may question its continued relevancy?
- How have the times we live in affected your commitment to the power of faith—have they strengthened your commitment, caused you to rethink the role of stewardship in your life or expanded your view of stewardship?

GriefShare Offers Hope and Reconciliation

The GriefShare Ministry is a support ministry to help the bereaved during their season of grief. GriefShare was established at Nineteenth Street in 2017 to help members and friends understand and navigate what is sometimes a difficult and challenging process following the death of a loved one.


The purpose of GriefShare is to provide hope, encouragement, and emotional support for individuals who may have experienced a life crisis caused by death. Consider joining GriefShare if you have lost a family member or friend—whether recently or a while ago.

The GriefShare Ministry conducts confidential life-changing support group sessions. The ministry follows a curriculum and guidelines that were developed by **Church Initiative**. Participants are provided workbooks that include weekly homework assignments on themes pertaining to the process of grief, bereavement, and hope. There are 13 weekly sessions. The 90-minute phone sessions are led by a team of well-trained instructors who are ministers, deacons, and lay facilitators experienced in dealing with the impact of grief on spiritual and social functioning.

Confidentiality is highly protected, so what is said in the group stays in the group. Prayer is a key component of the support process. The discussion sessions focus on blending biblical instruction and prayers with practical applications to life situations. The model seeks to meet the changing needs of individuals and family members.

Membership in GriefShare is open to all—church members and the wider community, regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, age, national origin, or mental or physical challenges.
