A Word from the Ministerial Council

The Holy Lenten Season

For Christians, Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation in observance of the sacrifice of Christ, beginning on Ash Wednesday and concluding the Thursday before Easter. As such, it is a time of self-examination and reflection. Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance for all Christians. In this season, we especially focus on strengthening our relationship with God and to growing as believers. We often choose to give up something or give more time in service to others.

In addition, February will highlight Black History Month, which will display the tremendous contributions that Black people have made to this country. Despite many challenges, we have kept the faith to overcome with God's grace. Fasting during Lent continues as a practice, symbolic of the reverent spirit of the Passion and celebration of the Resurrection.

The Ministerial Council recognizes all of the leaders of this great church and the countless unsung servants of God who have sustained us during this time of transition. Furthermore, we are grateful to this congregation for allowing the Ministerial Council to provide congregational care and spiritual leadership in worship. As we move forward together, we are reminded that God is unchanging and true to His word, He promised salvation and to be with us always. He keeps His promise forever and is worthy of our trust no matter the circumstances.

We acknowledge the serious challenges our society faces, from gun violence, to homelessness, to wage disparities, to inequalities in education and health care. We also are burdened by the soaring prices of food and gas and the daily cost of living. Meanwhile, our democracy is under siege, and the judicial system is exceptionally flawed. These issues have a disproportionate impact on people of color. But we must not lose sight that the Church has the moral and spiritual authority to employ God's power and grace to help bring solutions to all.

The presence of the Holy Spirit in our life changes everything for us. As we hear the Holy Spirit speak and allow Him to lead and empower us, we can have confidence that Christ lives in us. Therefore, having that personal relationship gives us the power to seek Him to guide us through any difficulties we may face. Let us keep this in mind as we use this Lenten devotional in the coming weeks as part of our devotions. We are thankful to the Deacon Board for compiling this spiritual tool each year.

Now, let us look to Calvary - knowing the power of the Resurrection is still working for us today (Philippians 3:10-14).

Lent - Day One February 14 ~ Ash Wednesday



SCRIPTURE

Proverbs 31:10-31 (NIV)

"10 A wife of noble character who can find? She is worth far more than rubies. "11 Her husband has full confidence in her and lacks nothing of value. 12 She brings him good, not harm, all the days of her life. 13 She selects wool and flax and works with eager hands..."

²⁵"She is clothed with strength and dignity; she can laugh at the days to come. ²⁶She speaks with wisdom, and faithful instruction is on her tongue. ²⁷She watches over the affairs of her household and does not eat the bread of idleness. ²⁸Her children arise and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her: ²⁹Many women do noble things, but you surpass them all. ³⁰Charm is deceptive, and beauty is fleeting; but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. ³¹Honor her for all that her hands have done, and let her works bring her praise at the city gate."

REFLECTION

It is my prayer, as we navigate this current season of transition, that we grow both as a church body and in doing good and that we be uplifted and inspired by our history, not constrained by it.

The needs in this season are great – from food insecurity, healthcare inequities, and the shortage of affordable housing, to calls for social and environmental justice, protecting, in the words of historian John Hope Franklin, the "unvarnished truth" of Black history, and for me, especially, being good stewards of our historic Black churches, particularly, the buildings that house them. These are the structures that have long been places not only of worship, but also of refuge, learning, community, and the Civil Rights Movement, and are worthy of our care.

So, as we go through this Lenten season and season of transition, led by the Holy Spirit, let us remain mindful of what God requires of us – "to act justly... to love mercy and to walk humbly" with God.

And finally, let us fully realize and reflect upon the meaning of being steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for we know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.

Paul, no doubt, had all these things. He was a Pharisee and a man of prominence, and it can be assumed that a good life was attached to these things. But Paul considered them waste in comparison to living for Christ. Today, too many of us may have worldly attachments that keep us from serving Christ, and we may need to learn to forget them just as Paul was willing to do.

We also must learn to be willing to forget our pains and problems. We cannot go forward in our walk with Christ until we are willing to lay aside some hurt, offense or problems. Like a computer that has locked up because it cannot resolve a problem, we too often get stuck on a recent difficulty we can't seem to get over. The result is a heart that is not focused on Christ, a spirit unable to pursue right things, and an attitude that lacks grace and peace.

In 2024, let's not be held captive by life injuries. Forgetting is often the prerequisite to going forward. As we follow the example of the Apostle Paul and echo his words of "this one thing I do," let's not miss the truth, that to reach ahead and press forward it is necessary to forget some things and keep it moving.

PRAYER

Dear God, as we enter this new year, give us the spirit of Paul, to press forward for a prize. Let us realize that there is simply nothing to be gained by going back to past hurts and refusing to get over them. However, by forgiving and pressing forward, we gain a greater Christlikeness. As we keep moving, we gain strength, maturity, understanding, and patience. We grow in wisdom and faith and give both our offenders and us the opportunity to learn from the past and be better in the future. Amen.

Didn't You Know?

SCRIPTURE

Jeremiah 32:15-17, 26-27 (NIV)

"15 For this is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says: Houses, fields and vineyards will again be bought in this land." After I had given the deed of purchase to Baruch son of Neriah, I prayed to the Lord: Ah, Sovereign Lord, you have made the heavens and the earth by your great power and outstretched arm. Nothing is too hard for you."

"26Then the word of the Lord came to Jeremiah: '27I am the Lord, the God of all mankind. Is anything too hard for me?"

REFLECTION

The biblical passages from Jeremiah 32:15-17 and 26-27 invite us to reflect on Jeremiah's trust in God's ability to bring about restoration even amid insurmountable challenges. In the face of imminent danger, Jeremiah found himself confined in a royal prison for delivering a message that King Zedekiah was unwilling to receive. The Babylonians closed in on Jerusalem, and the prophet's circumstances appeared grim. Yet, within the depths of uncertainty, God revealed a plan - a cousin would approach Jeremiah, asking him to redeem (purchase) their family's land. The prophetic revelation was accompanied with a command to engage in the transaction and a divine promise: "Houses and fields and vineyards shall be possessed again in this land" (v. 15).

As we consider Jeremiah's prayers, let us connect our theological imagination with today's concerns.

Lord, nothing is too hard for You. We recognize Your help in ages past, encompassing blessings, and enduring love. We, Your people, have fallen short of keeping Your word and honoring our covenant with You. We sing songs of lament. Hearts are downcast. Our faith falters. Please help us understand how we will come back from this thing.

Hear the Lord's timeless response:

"I am the Lord, the God of all mankind. Is anything too hard for me?" (Jeremiah 32:27, NIV) May this reflection inspire a deepened trust in God's power and an unwavering hope for restoration. Our faith is rooted in the unshakeable truth that nothing is too hard for our God who orchestrates redemption and restoration, even in the face of adversity and uncertainty.

PRAYER

O Sovereign Lord, Creator of all, we acknowledge the fullness of Your power, love, mercy, and grace. In the solemnity of Lent, we humbly seek Your guidance. Let us remember nothing is too hard for You. May this season be a time of spiritual renewal and a deepening of our faith and commitment to following the path You have laid before us. Amen.

SCRIPTURE

REFLECTION

No more debilitating depression. I can only explain it by proclaiming God. The God that loved me all along. The God that knew that I would come through the fire and storms to share my story with someone that needs to know that they are never alone.

I've gotten acquainted with Jesus Christ. I strive to allow the Holy Spirit to be my guide and to subject my human self to His will.

During those years of "separation" God blessed me, in spite of my ungratefulness. I never inventoried the many breaths I've effortlessly taken in my 68 years. I didn't bother to credit God for my good health, ability to write creatively, or for my career. I barely appreciated my family, and rarely acknowledged that God surrounded me with loving and supportive friends. I've never been food insecure, or unhoused. I've been kept safe. I've traveled, been able to serve the least of these, and know the peace that truly surpasses all understanding.

Friends and family led me to different churches. The key was having the Holy Spirit lead me to God.

Heavenly Father, I thank you. Thank you for Your love. Thank you for Your care. Thank you for Your innumerable blessings. Thank you for the opportunity to come before You with a contrite heart. The Spirit searches all things, even the deep things of God. ¹¹ For who among men knows the thoughts of a man except the man's spirit within him? In the same way no one knows the thoughts of God except the Spirit of God. ¹²We have not received the spirit of the world but the Spirit who is from God, that we may understand what God has freely given us."

PRAYER

The message is beyond the scope of what eyes have seen and beyond what ears have heard, and beyond what has entered the hearts of men. The Apostle Paul desperately wants his readers to grasp the understanding that it is by the Holy Spirit that God's message is revealed. Without this revelation, we as Believers cannot fathom how much God the Father, our Creator, Ruler and Maker of All Things loves each of so much that He, out of His great love for us, sacrificed His only begotten Son, that we who believe may have an eternal resting place with Him. In this season, let us be reminded of the words that Isaiah penned, "that no eye has seen, ear has heard, or human heart has 'imagined' what God has prepared for those who LOVE Him."

The Holy Spirit and The Color Purple

SCRIPTURE

John 19:2 (KJV)

"And the soldiers platted a crown of thorns and put it on his head, and they put on him a purple robe."

REFLECTION

Much has been written about the significance of the color purple as it relates to nature and spirituality. Purple is a combination of the deepest red and brilliant blue. The purple color family ranges in color from the lighter purple color of lavender and the ethereal soft pale purple of the lilac bloom to the deep richness of plum, grape, and vibrant eggplant. This beautiful color became more popular in contemporary society because of the book *The Color Purple* written by Alice Walker. It was made into a movie in 1985 that became controversial because of its subject content. A recent release (2024) has again brought it to the forefront for newer as well as older generations. This was to signify that He considered Himself "King of the Jews." Accusers used the sacred cloth as a mockery to His being the Royal King. Of course, they rejected Him as being the King of Kings. Thus, the color represents obedience, repentance, faith, death, resurrection, and transition. Jesus was obedient to God until the end. He repented of His grief and foreboding. His ultimate faith in God, His death and resurrection are the reasons we can declare, "In him I live and breathe, and have my being." Jesus ushered in a new season to all who would believe. Love As God Loves

SCRIPTURE

Romans 12:9-13 (NIV)

"9Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. 10Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honor one another above yourselves. 11Never be lacking in zeal but keep your spiritual fervor in serving the Lord. 12Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer.

"13 Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality."

REFLECTION

We live in a culture that absolutely adores radical individualism. However, the Bible has called us to action in loving and serving others. The scriptures are clear! God wants us to love and honor others above ourselves. (Matthew 22:37-39) As Christians, we are to honor others because they have been created in God's image, because they are our brothers and sisters in Christ, and because they have a unique contribution to make to Christ's church.

Many of us have learned how to pretend to love others—how to speak kindly, avoid hurting their feelings, and appear to take an interest in them. We may even be skilled in pretending to feel moved with compassion when we hear of others' needs, or to become indignant when we learn of injustice. But God, calls us to real and sincere love that goes far beyond pretense and politeness. Sincere love requires concentration and effort. It means helping others become better people. It demands our time, money, and personal involvement. No one individual has the capacity to express love to a whole community, but the body of Christ certainly does have this ability. Therefore, let us as a church family commit our lives to the task of Kingdom building. "Whosoever will, let them come, in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." (Mark 8:34-38; John 3:16)

The Apostle Paul reminds us that he is strong when he is weak, because when he is weak, God's grace is most powerful. (2 Corinthians 12:9-10) Consequently, the message for the child of God is: "We can do all things through Christ who gives us the strength." (Philippians 4:13)

Life can present us with many challenging situations. Some of us have more difficult problems than others, but we all usually get our share sooner, or later. Some of us when trouble comes, use it as an occasion for finding new resources, so we can meet the situation and live victoriously in spite of it.

Jesus is our example of God's love for all eternity. Today, the church is encountering new dangers, new burdens, new testing. We can quit; we can grow bitter; or like Paul we can seek God's guidance in times of uncertainty. He is the source of our strength. We will find that character comes by testing, and even a cross can be a road to victory.

God will identify who we are to serve, if we ask in prayer, attend church regularly and commune faithfully with other believers. We are also to trust the Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit to give us the courage, wisdom, and strength to do what may appear at times to be impossible; to love and honor others above ourselves.

With You Lord in our lives we are able to illuminate dark places like stars in the night, which lighten up the darkest night. Men and women are then able to see You and Your love, new hope, and forgiveness of their sins. Amen!

Lent - The Holy Week March 24 - March 30



SCRIPTURE

Luke 24:1-5 (NKJV)

"Now on the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they, and certain other women with them, came to the tomb bringing the spices which they had prepared. ²But they found the stone rolled away from the tomb. ³Then they went in and did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. ⁴And it happened, as they were greatly perplexed about this, that behold, two men stood by them in shining garments. ⁵Then, as they were afraid and bowed their faces to the earth, they said to them, 'Why do you seek the living among the dead?'"

PRAYER

Eternal God, may we continue to seek You for who You are, not who we expect You to be, or who You used to be in our lives. Forgive us when we try to define You by our limited experiences and understanding instead of the reality of who You are. Lead and guide me according to Your will and Your way, even when I don't understand Your will and Your way. Renew my faith and give me a fresh understanding of You, O Lord. Help me embrace the new ways in which You work and the new things You have in store for me. Amen.

REFLECTION

These women were on a mission. When someone dies, the Jewish custom is to anoint the body with spices and oils before wrapping the body in the burial cloth. When Jesus' body was taken down from the cross, there wasn't enough time to do this ritual and bury Him before the Sabbath started. Because they wanted to honor Jesus, they still wanted to perform this ritual and waited until after the Sabbath was over to do it. Their mission was honorable. However, Mary, Johanna, and the other women were on the wrong mission.

They were looking for the corpse of Jesus. The angels asked, "Why are you looking for the living among the dead?" Here's the problem with looking for a dead Jesus. A dead Jesus cannot teach. A dead Jesus cannot heal. A dead Jesus cannot prophesy. A dead Jesus cannot bring forth new life. A dead Jesus cannot transform. A dead Jesus cannot save. Instead, what they should have been looking for is the Living God, Jesus the Christ.

But when the angels asked, "why are you looking for the living among the dead," everything shifted. Now they were put on the path to look for the living God. But if you want to look for the living God, you need to know where to focus your attention.

Leaving the tomb didn't just mean physically walking out of the tomb, but metaphorically shifting our expectations as well. Because of the angel's admonition, Mary and the disciples stopped defining Jesus by the circumstances that used to exist. They might not have understood what was happening "now," but they stopped focusing exclusively on what happened "then." Three days ago, Jesus was crucified. Seven days ago, Jesus was riding into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey with everyone loving Him. Previously, He fed the 5,000 and raised Lazarus from the dead. If their memory was stuck at what happened three days ago, or seven days ago, or what Jesus did in the past, they wouldn't have been looking in the right place for Jesus' current work, which was overcoming death and restoring the fellowship between God and humankind.

Where are you looking for the Living God? If your testimony about what God has done in your life is stuck in the past, you're not looking in the right place for the Living God. If you keep going back to the "good old days" when church was "good," your money was "right," or things were just "better," you're not look for what Jesus is doing today. Instead, you're looking for Jesus in the wrong place. Memories are great, but memories alone do not give you an abundant life. Memories can be wonderful and meaningful, but they aren't the living water that Jesus told the woman at the well about. Memories alone don't give you the strength for today and the bright hope for tomorrow. Memories don't save. When the Hebrews escaped Egypt and Moses was leading them across the desert to the Promised Land, God dropped manna from heaven every day so they wouldn't starve. The memories of yesterday's manna could not feed you today. Yesterday is dead and gone. We have to stop holding on to yesterday's blessings so tightly that we miss today's blessings. Stop looking for Jesus in the past and embrace the new thing He is doing in the present.

Where are you looking for the Living God? To find Him, we've got to go back to the cross. We're not looking at Jesus on the cross as a sign of defeat like Mary did, or the eleven remaining of His disciples, or His followers. For them, when they were watching Jesus die on the cross, they were also watching their hopes and dreams die right along with Him. But Jesus is not bound by the limitations of our experience or our imagination.

We know that the cross wasn't the end of God's work, it was God moving us to a new level of relationship. Without Jesus dying on it and being resurrected on the third day, we would not be able to have close, deep, intimate fellowship with God.

This passage presents us with a choice. We can stay in the tomb with the memory of Jesus, or we can leave the tomb and seek the vibrant, active, Living God, the God that overcame death, has all power, and brings transformation and abundant life. Where are you looking for the Living God?
